Has Birmingham Inter-Varsity Club changed over the years?

As a long-serving member I am sometimes asked if IVC has changed. My usual answer: "not much".

In an attempt to give an object answer, I have done a snapshot of events over the last 50 years by reproducing the back page diary of June bulletins from 1959, 1969, 1979 & 1989.

These bulletin back pages are tidied-up versions that have been OCR'd. Until 1984 Bulletins were produced on A4 paper using IVC's own duplicator from wax-paper stencil masters. An example of an original is reproduced elsewhere on JohnPitcock.com Text was done with a typewriter (ribbon removed) and drawings with a stylus or occasionally cut electronically by an outside service <u>http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Mimeograph</u>. Bulletins were collated and stapled by volunteers on bulletin night. (There is a modern electronic duplicator where I work http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Risograph).

Average age in 1979 - low 30's Annual Subs £8 (£30 in 2009 money)

Committee Positions in 1979 (Then called Council)

Chairman, Treasurer, Secretary, Bulletin Editor, Farmhouse Warden, Membership Secretary, Office Manager (Bulletin printing), Premises Manager, Publicity Officer + ALO (Association Liason Officer), Social Secretary, Sport Secretary, + 2 Ordinary Committe Members (acting as assistants).

At other times there were also: Coventry Rep, Parties co-ordinator, Folk Dance Rep.

Coventry Sub Group had nine of their own activities, mostly pubs and meals. They had their own account and committee member.

(Since 1979 Redditch sub-group had become an IVC in its own right, this folded after a few years).

Average age in 1989 - mid 30's Average age now - low 50's Annual Subs £27 (£50 in 2009 money)

Has *Birmingham Inter-Varsity Club* changed over the years?

IVC used to be for graduates to continue the Social activities they'd enjoyed as students.

After looking at the old bulletins my answer is that IVC does many of the activities it always did; the main difference seems to be that, until the late 1960's, we had a weekly Friday "Hop".

A significant change has been not having our own city-centre premises referred to as "Club" (we've had four). Here people could drop-in to various events. Throughout the 1970's and 80's there were events most evenings in club (bridge, music, Wednesday club night, meetings, board games, slide shows, folk/country/Scottish dancing, table tennis. On a Saturday there was often either a party or a barn dance (members did the catering for these and "brought a bottle", often a party-seven or flagon of cider). IVC's last premises, 291 Corporation Street, wasn't really suitable for holding events so members got out of the habit of using the same venue for many activities.

"Club" was also a meeting place for carsharing for events such as rambles. Rambles were usually 10 - 12+ miles – Don Matthews says he led one most Sundays for several years and people walked in all weathers. He says there used to be a problem finding enough people with cars. If they used a pub at all, it was only for a quick drink and toilet stop. There was sometimes a Chinese meal on the way home.

Members made more of their own entertainment: board games, music, bridge, chess, slide shows, dinner parties etc.

Some changes have been because of differences in society i.e. pub-going was rare as pubs weren't female-friendly and they didn't do food.

In the early days there were few professional jobs open to women: in the early 1970's about 1/4 of the female members were

teachers and 1/4 in the medical professions (mainly nurses).

Weekends away used to be mostly at our own bunkhouse two miles from Barmouth - called "Llwyn-on Isaf" or "the Farmhouse": a 17th century house that BIVC leased from a local sheep farmer from 1957 to 1993. (see elsewhere on www.johnpitcock.com). IVC had its own sailing boat which was kept at Barmouth from 1959 to 1974.

Sport was more of a social event – Don says it has become more competitive.

One thing that hasn't changed is the name IVC and debating about changing it - there is a mention in the 1966 AGM minutes of a discussion to its suitability.

Has IVC changed because members have got older?

Until the 1980s, there was a much greater turnover of members: in the early years we lost over 1/3 of the members per year and recruited a similar number of replacements. There was very little publicity budget: mostly it was by word-of-mouth. Many young people would have left as they married and had children - older people are more settled in their careers. More members than now lived with their parents.

Attracting people younger than the average member has been a recurring problem for IVCs

A quote from the minutes of the 1967 AGM, during a debate on the motion that that introduced an upper age limit of 40: "Activities would tend to cater for the 25-35 age group instead of the 20-25 group for which the club was originally founded" (motions on age limits and an historic age profile of members are listed elsewhere on www.johnpitcock.com).

One change I have noticed is that members aren't, in general, trying to find a partner and settle down and start a family.
